For almost three quarters of a century, Brother Davis has served the fraternity with a zeal and passion unequalled by most. Although his father, George F. David, II was the third Grand Polemarch of Kappa Alpha Psi Fraternity, George David, III pursued his fraternal journey always walking in his own moccasins.

During the night of Thursday, April 3, 2014, the doors of Chapter Invisible swung open to welcome another Kappa giant into the fold.

I knew Professor David more than three-score years ago; He taught me Social Science and all the students loved him so; He was a friendly educator who made it easy for us to learn; Yet he taught us that our future depended on what we'd earn. I met George the third much later on my journey in Phi Nu Pi; I didn't meet him while in school; George was 13 years older than I; Later I joined the Washington Alumni, since my home was in D. C. George was in Baltimore Alumni and he wasn't far from me. I had a cousin named Charles Tildon; he was a Baltimore Kappa man, He was a great friend of George; they seemed to get along hand in hand; Now everybody knew that Charles Tildon tended to want things his way, But George was not a potted plant, he'd make darn sure to have his say. As years went by we worked in the Kappa vineyard sharing as we'd go; We had a tremendous respect for each other and both loved Kappa so; When I looked at my emails on April fourth early in the day; I read that my friend had borne his cross and silently stole away. So I won't listen for the telephone, I won't dial his number anymore; I'll just wait and keep on working for Kappa, until I reach that golden shore; I hope that I'll get to see his father again, and see George three at his side; Ride on dear brother, ride on my friend, it's been a magnificent ride.

George F. David, III attended Wilberforce University in Wilberforce, Ohio. His father and our third Grand Polemarch, George F. David, II was a professor at Wilberforce. Wilberforce University was founded in 1856 by members of the Methodist Episcopal Church. Wilberforce is the first predominantly African-American private university in the nation.

George F. David, III was initiated at Wilberforce University, December 7, 1940 into the Delta of Kappa Alpha Psi Fraternity, Inc.

Over the years Brother David continued to be a viable member of the Wilberforce Delta Alumni Chapter, where he remained a beloved participant with his Delta brothers.

In later years, Brother David joined the Baltimore (MD) Alumni Chapter where he served zealously until his peaceful transition in 2014. David was an advocate for fraternity history, especially vocal about inaccuracies that he observed in our Story of Kappa Alpha Psi and other documents he reviewed with great scrutiny.







Obituary George Franklin David, III

George Franklin David III was born on November 6, 1923 in the family home in Wilberforce, Ohio. George was the first born child of Olivette Poole David and George F. David II. He attended Wilberforce University Laboratory School and the Wilberforce Academy. He entered Wilberforce University in 1939 at the age of fifteen. His had a very active college career. He was Vice President of his class the last three years, a member of the Student Government and Pan Hellenic Council, an Advanced ROTC student, elected to Sword and Shield (leadership honorary) and Sen Mer Rekh (scholastic honorary). He was initiated into the Delta chapter of Kappa Alpha Psi in 1940 and subsequently served as Keeper of Records and Polemarch of that chapter. George majored in Chemistry and Zoology and graduated Cum Laude in May, 1943.

Upon graduation, George was detailed to the Chemical Warfare Service (CWS) Officer Candidate School in Edgewood Arsenal, Maryland. He was commissioned a 2nd Lieutenant CWS in August 1943. He volunteered to go overseas with the 165th Chemical Smoke Generator Company in December 1943. During World War II, George served in England, France, Belgium, Luxembourg and Germany, earning three bronze battle stars. As the war was ending in 1945, he was sent to the University of St. Andrews in Scotland under a special program to study Chemistry and Physics. Upon return to the USA, he served in the 25th infantry in Fort Benning, Georgia and ended his military career on the ROTC staff at North Carolina AT&T College. He was honorably discharged in 1949 as a Captain in the US Army.

George married Annie Lee Smith in 1952. To this union were born his son, George F. David IV, and his daughter, Lynn Anise David Irby. The marriage ended in divorce.

George began his professional career as a Quality Control Chemist of the Glidden Company in Chicago in 1950, working for Dr. Percy Julian, a renowned medical professional, academic, civil rights activist, and chemist. In 1952 he began his long and illustrious career in the meat industry starting with Oscar Mayer & Co. and holding increasingly responsible operations positions with Sinai Kosher Sausage Company and Superior Meat Company. He concluded his career in business at the Parks Sausage Company in Baltimore, Maryland beginning in 1968. Starting as Director of Manufacturing, he ended as Vice President of Operations and co-owner. George was part of a four person group that purchased controlling interest in the company. He retired from business in 1988, but continued an active volunteer career.

George was very active in the community. He served as President of Hilltop Community Association, member of the Liberty Road Community Council and the Western Alliance of Concerned Communities. He served on the Board of Directors for the USO of Central Maryland, the Children's Guild, and the Girl Scouts of Central Maryland, as well as serving on their finance committee. He served as Treasurer of Mutual Housing of Baltimore and Director of the Public Member's Association of the Foreign Service. He received an award for community service from the United Fund. He remained an active supporter of Wilberforce University, serving as president of the Baltimore Alumni for a time. He was a life member of the NAACP and 100 Black Men of Maryland.

A significant part of his life was devoted to Kappa Alpha Psi Fraternity, Inc. The David family is proud to boast four generations of Kappa men. Initiated in 1940, George was a life member and active until the end. He did not miss a Fraternity Conclave since his son became a Kappa in 1973. Although he served in many capacities at the chapter and province level, his most significant contributions were as author of The History of the Eastern Province, first and second editions and as Chairman of the Senior Kappa Affairs Committee (International) from 1999-2013. He has received 25 chapter and province awards during his membership in the Baltimore Chapter, including two Pillar of the Province awards. On the international level, he has twice been awarded the William L. Crump History award and most recently was awarded one of the Fraternity's most prestigious honors, the Elder Watson Diggs Award, at the 2013 Conclave. Even with all of these accolades, George called himself a "Party Kappa". He loved the good times and the camaraderie of the Fraternity.

George found time for his other passions. Up until his 80's, he was an avid tennis player. He loved watching football and was a Baltimore Ravens season ticket holder. He also was a connoisseur of classical music and opera, holding season tickets to the Symphony and Opera, a love he shared with his Sweetheart, DeVera Redmond. He was a seasoned traveler and kept a large map with numerous pins showing where he had been. "I've been everywhere I wanted to go, and I've had a good life."

He leaves to cherish his memory his son George Franklin David IV, his daughter Lynn David Irby, his son-in-law Marvin Irby, two grandchildren, Jessica Nicole David and David Franklin Irby, his sister Virginia Hamilton, his sweetheart of 25 years DeVera Redmond and a host of nieces, nephews, in-laws, fraternity brothers and friends.












Our Brother's Swan Song

George David Did it His Way


